Thoughts on Ministry of Healing

(29) The Builders of the Home (pages 356-362)

Summary:

The focus of this chapter is on marriage: how to choose a spouse, what to do when the romance wears off, and how to build a love that will last a lifetime.

Thoughts:

Christ specially honored marriage in two ways; by performing His first miracle at a marriage festival and making marriage a symbol of the union between Him and His redeemed ones (Eph 5). (356)

Marriage was designed to be a blessing to the whole human race, so it should be entered into with great care and thoughtful consideration. The first step in this consideration is to make the best possible choice, considering the potential partner's attitudes, character, physical and mental vigor, and relation to God. Where available, parents should be consulted. (356-359)

While love is not a feeling, but a principle (358), a marriage with no passion isn't much fun. So this statement needs to be combined with the thoughts on page 360, which indicate that feelings do matter. We need to study how to advance each others happiness (a feeling) and continue "the early attentions."

Having made a choice and entered into marriage, the next key step is dealing with the disillusionment that inevitably comes when the romance wears off and the two parties are seen in their true character. At this point it is critical that each party focuses on the excellencies discovered in each other rather than the defects and weaknesses. Love needs to be expressed over and over in kindness, sympathy and the self-sacrificing forgiveness of Christ. The kind of focus on each other that lovers give naturally during the romance stage, needs to be exercised in the long run by choice. (359-361)

But even the best of marriages can get stuck in a focus on each other. Ultimately, happiness is found when the couple reaches out to others in unselfish service. (362) Service is an important component of a sound marriage.

An important part of the world view that is implied in this chapter is that there is a lot of continuity between this world and the world to come. The present is not completely annihilated when Jesus comes. The bodily resurrection means that what we do with the body (and by extension our homes and relationships) matters for eternity. There is continuity. This world view explains the Adventist ability to combine social action in this world with an apocalyptic pessimism about where the world is going. What we do now matters for eternity.

A brief comment on 360, "Let neither husband nor wife harbor the thought that their union is a mistake or a disappointment." She does not say, "never entertain the thought" or "never allow the thought to enter your mind," but do not "harbor the thought." In the real world such thoughts may come to mind, but they are not to be "harbored" or dwelt on.
