Thoughts on Ministry of Healing

(39) The Knowledge Received Through God's Word (pages 458-466)

Summary:

Received, believed and obeyed, the Bible is the great instrumentality in the transformation of character. Sin darkens our minds and dims our perceptions. But as sin is purged from our hearts through the Scriptures, God's presence in our lives opens up both the Bible and the book of nature.

Thoughts:

Youth are easily led into temptation and sin because they do not study the Bible and meditate upon it as they should. The truths of the Bible would produce inward rectitude and strength of principle that would enable them to resist temptation (458-459). The mind that is earthly finds no pleasure in God's Word, the mind renewed by the Holy Spirit finds beauty and light in every page. If youth will make the Bible the food of mind and soul they would be fortified against temptation (460).

Unless the above principles are in place, those studying the sciences will tend to put nature above God. A correct understanding of both the Bible and science will prove them to be in harmony. (461-462)

When we read a chapter like this we need to keep two contexts in mind. First, what did Ellen White actually mean when she wrote these statements back in her time and place? And second, what impact will her choice of words have in today's context? After a hundred years the same words can have very different meanings in another time and place.

This chapter states what is in some ways the key theme of *Ministry of Healing*, that the Bible and science illuminate each other. By this Ellen White does not mean that the Bible and science must line up in every detail, but that an understanding of the cross and of the character of God are essential to making sense of the results of science. But while stating this principle in general, Ellen White does not explain how (the "hermeneutics") we are to come to such a conclusion. She is casting a vision more than she is explaining how to get there or the exact details one will find when one gets there. In many ways this is the grounding philosophy behind Loma Linda University and its commitment to the integration of faith and science.

One might get the impression from this statement that the Bible not only comes from God in its spiritual message, but that it is an infallible guide to history, science and even geography. That impression should be balanced with her statements regarding the humanness of Scripture in places such as *1 Selected Messages*, 19-21 and the Introduction to *The Great Controversy*. History tells us that in trying to be true to the Bible, church people have often misread science (Galileo for example). But we must also be open to the possibility that at times we have misread the Bible as well. So an integration between the two requires rigorous attention to the evidence of both.

One other important insight in the chapter (and also the New Testament) is that the line between the present and eternity is not sharply drawn. Eternity in many ways begins now. The spiritual growth that we experience now and the talents that we train and exercise here will have implications for the kind of life we live in the beyond. The Second Coming of Jesus is more like a graduation than an awakening into a totally different kind of life.
