Thoughts on Ministry of Healing

(40) Help in Daily Living (pages 469-482)

Summary:

The main point of this chapter is that spiritual development is about the integration of inner and outer faithfulness to God. God uses trials to foster this integration and prepare people for greater service.

Thoughts:

Chapters 40-43 are among the most fruitful and inspiring of all of Ellen White's writings. It tells us that the entire goal of Jesus' ministry was to incline the hearts of others toward God. The concept of character is a strong unifying theme throughout chapters 36-43.

To convince others of the grace of God we need to know its power in our own hearts and lives. The strongest argument in favor of the gospel is a loving and lovable Christian. (469-470)

God uses trials and obstacles to develop these qualities in us. So it is crucial not to wish for different circumstances but to accept the circumstances in which we find ourselves and apply ourselves to the tasks at hand. (470-473)

In the future life we will understand all the seemingly unanswered prayers and disappointed hopes. The life of Moses is a good example. (473-476)

God esteems people more on the basis of their humility, purity of motive and beauty of character than on their talents, bustle and self-importance. (477-478)

A major theme of this chapter is that God uses suffering to develop beautiful qualities of character in us. These thoughts can be quite encouraging, as finding meaning in suffering helps people to deal with it. But it may be fair to ask the question, *Is God's plan for each person as detailed and direct as the chapter seems to suggest? Or is God's plan for each person more open-ended?* Adventists have tended away from views of God that suggest every detail of our lives being overseen and controlled by Him. We have focused more on human freedom and the difference people can make in the fulfillment of God's goals for the world. The book of Job also tells us that some tragedies are so great that they may not seem to have a teaching purpose. So the thoughts in this chapter, as in many others, need to be applied in the context of "all other things being equal."
